Education in the garden

He was appointed an OBE in 2001 for services to organic faming, and also served as head of the Soil Association.

End of an era: the White Hart Inn closes

Villagers have cause to mourn this week, as the centuries-old White Hart Inn appears to have closed, possibly never to re-open as a pub.

In 2004 Kevin and Camilla Reilly bought the pub from Nicky and Dorothy Aromando, who had run it for 20 years as a popular Italian restaurant. Under the new owners in 2004 the emphasis moved more towards attracting local beer-drinkers with real ale, whilst still offering a full restaurant service. However a succession of initiatives – happy hour, the ± 5 carvery, beer festivals, karaoke and quiz nights – failed to beat the recession.

The White Hart is currently being advertised for $\pounds 650,00$ by Sidney Phillips, an agency specialising in selling pubs. (The 2004 sale price was $\pounds 635,000$.) It is however believed that a possible fate of the premises will be conversion to a private house. This will require planning permission, which may be opposed, but if no-one can be found to buy it as a pub the loss to the village will be inevitable.

The true age of the White Hart is not known, although it it likely to go back at least to the seventeenth century. Owned by the Craven estate until 1950, the White Hart has also in its time served as coroner's court, timber saleroom, rent office, auction house and general village meeting place.

The Community Speedwatch programme, in which trained village volunteers work with Thames Valley Police (TVP) in logging motorists who speed through the 30mph zone, can now move forward, thanks to insurance arrangements facilitated by the parish council. Training dates are expected to be announced soon by Robin Tandy.

Earlier in the year TVP conducted a 40-minute monitoring exercise in the village, in which 12 drivers were caught over the speed limit. They have received warning letters and have been added to the speed database.

Planning applications

Hamstead Growers' Holtwood House has an

application for temporary siting of a mobile home has been refused. A separate retrospective application in respect of equestrian activities was approved in March, subject to conditions, enforcement of which has gone to appeal. application for an enclosed swimming pool with bat loft pending.

Holtwood Farm has two applications pending for: 1) a new hay and straw barn 2) change of use of an agricultural/equine building to a dwelling.

The parish council has opposed the former, invoking the Village Design Statement. It was however decided at the May meeting to support the dwelling application. No 1 Elm Farm Cottages is seeking a two-storey extension, to which the parish council has no objection.

The application from No 24 (Chapel Corner) for an obscured-glass window to replace an existing false window has been refused on the grounds that it is a variation from permission previously granted. No 50-51 (Craven Hill) has permission for a brick bound-

ary wall to replace a hedge.

Annual parish assembly

The parish assembly held at the village hall on Monday 17 May was sparsely attended, and business was completed in less than 15 minutes. The chairman's report briefly described a quiet year. Gordon Fisher will continue to chair the parish council, with John Handy continuing to serve as vicechairman.

Correction: the item in the March Hamstead Hornet concerning election to the parish council was a year out. Hamstead Marshall parish council does not fall due for reelection unil 2011.

The parish assembly was followed immediately by the end-of-year parish council meeting, at which it was reported that income for 2009-10 (from the parish precept) was £2,300. Expenditure was as follows: £1,560 on clerking fees £809 on security lighting at Ash Tree Grove £185 on audit fees £84 on hall hire £43 on membership of BALC. The parish precept this year increases by 7.5%. This increase averages at around £1.50 more per household.

The parish council bank account also acts as a conduit for parish plan finances. Parish plan expenditure this last year was £8,047.
