Can the White Hart be saved?

Planning committee confused themselves and us

The council chamber was packed to capacity with villagers who turned out on 30th March to hear the WBC planning committee's decision on the White Hart. They left the meeting believing that the campaign to save the pub had been given six months' grace. Even the journalists present gained this impression, and both the Newbury Weekly News and the Newbury and Thatcham Observer subsequently reported a reprieve on their websites.

Following presentations from the parish council chair John Handy and Tom Lane representing the campaign to save the pub, the owner Stella Coulthurst and her adviser Alan Smith spoke in support of the application. Hamstead's two local councillors, Anthony Stansfeld and James Cole, argued against and for the application respectively.

It was clear that the committee wanted to give the campaigning villagers more time to get their finance and business plans together. The committee expressed its intention to look again, and possibly more favourably, on a more developed proposal in six months' time.

However, it seems that the councillors were in error. A query the next day to Michael Butler, WBC's chief planning officer, established beyond doubt that the councillors had refused the application for change of use*, but that they had no power to delay the applicant's going to appeal, which Stella Coulthurst, the White Hart's owner, has since announced her intention of doing. So far, however, there is no evidence of this online. She gave this statement on 7th June:

"The situation regarding the White Hart Inn is, sadly, almost completely unchanged from the March Planning Committee, other than a violent attempted break-in last week (now in the hands of the police). The pub has continued to be marketed through Christie & Co, with some further viewings. No commercial operator has made an offer for the lease. No proposal has been received from the "Save" campaign. As owner, I intend to pursue a change of use through all available avenues."

The campaign progresses

Supporters of the Save the White Hart campaign gathered at the village hall on 14th May to hear presentations from Anne Budd, Peter Chaffey, Kathrin Luddecke of the Plunkett Foundation, which advises and makes grants to community co-operatives, and two representatives of community-run pubs, Graham Shelton of the Red Lion in Northmoor and Chris French of the Plough in West Hanney.

There was strong support, from those present and some that couldn't make the meeting, for setting up a the Save The White Hart Community Enterprise Committee to develop a business plan and raise funds. The priority is to develop an operating model by:

creating a start-up and five-year budget;

establishing funding to support the venture until it is self-financing;

creating a fund for legal and other setting-up expenses;

continuing the search for a commercial buyer (that is not on Christie & Co's mailing list) for the White Hart;

getting the White Hart listed as an Asset of Community Value, to provide protection. In a written statement Pete Evans, facilitator of the steering committee, has said:

"The team will continue to address and resist any appeal, should there be one, against the refusal of the West Berks Council to grant planning permission for change of use, unless the leasehold and the freehold have been offered for sale on the open market on reasonable terms at a reasonable price and for a reasonable length of time.

"We still need volunteers from the village. Please contact me at info@savethewhitehart.org if you can provide any help, no matter how small; it is all greatly appreciated."

Extract from "...The Council considers that, in the light of the advice contained in West Berkshire Councils's Supplementary Planning Guidance 19 - Public Houses, the White Hart Public House may be potentially viable for use as a licensed premises in the future. In addition the Council is not satisfied that the marketing exercise undertaken by the applicant has been adequately undertaken, having regard to current market expectations and valuations for public houses in West Berkshire. Accordingly the true redundancy of The White Hart is in question and so this fails the test of criterion 2 in Policy CS4 of the countryside policies contained in the West Berkshire Council Housing site allocations Development Plan Document - November 2015 on countryside policies. Given the fact that The White Hart is a valued local facility, important for community cohesion as identified both in the NPPF and policy ADPP5 in the West Berkshire Core Strategy 2006 to 2026, the application is unacceptable...

Villagers quizzed




