White Hart fate hangs in the balance again



Stella Coulthurst, the owner of the White Hart, has filed a second planning application to turn the former pub into four dwellings, which she has said she intends to let.

This follows refusal of her previous application last April, when the Western Area Planning Committee attempted to put the application on hold for six months to give local campaigners a chance to come up with a viable plan for running the pub. After the meeting it was ruled by council officers that, without such powers, the committee had essentially refused the application.

Since then the pub has continued to be let for residential accommodation. Local campaigners have fought to save it with the establishment of a working group and some recent vigorous publicity. Last summer the White Hart was granted ACV status, ie, officially recognising that it is an asset of community value. Two independent assessments arranged by the campaigners have declared that the pub has the potential for commercial viability.

The pub has been offered leasehold by Christie & Co since its closure in September 2016. The current terms (a reduction on the terms initially offered) include an initial rent of £35,000 in the first year, rising to £42,250 in the second year and then £50,000 in year three followed by a rent review. Several pub companies have shown interest but, according to the owner, usually decide against it on account of the location.

Since the submission of the second planning application Debra Inston, WBC's principal conservation and design officer, has requested an historical impact assessment and a visit to the site to assess its historical importance.

The WBC planning website displays around 150 letters of objection from within and well beyond the village. The website also says (as of 6th March) that the application is still open for comment.

The next meeting of the Western Area Planning Committee is at 6.30pm on Wednesday 15th March, but at the time of writing no agenda had been published, so it is not certain that the application will be discussed at this meeting. The agenda should be published a week in advance.

Statement by John Handy on behalf of the Save The White Hart Inn Group

The Save the White Hart Inn Group has revitalised its campaign to oppose the current application for change of use into dwellings and get the inn into the hands of an experienced operator.

As far as the group is concerned nothing has changed, and we are back at square one.

The pub closed through poor management and subsequent lack of business. The viability of the inn is not in question, two studies have proved this, and the building is not redundant.

We view the White Hart as the social centre of the village, and this has been confirmed by its listing as an Asset of Community Value and the high numbers of letters of objection (150+) submitted to the West Berkshire planning department.

All planning policy recognises the importance of pubs to rural communities, and there is no justification for the planning authority to grant the owner change of use.

About 25 local people gathered at the Red House on 20th February for the launch of a new group, the Friends of Hamstead Marshall and Marsh Benham. The meeting was organised by Johnny and Sarah Stevenson in conjunction with members of St Mary's Church.

Over the last couple of years St Mary's has benefited from a lively social programme organised by the church support team, and it was proposed that this new Friends group devise and co-ordinate more social events within the village for the church and for other charitable fund-raising. Those attending heard presentations from three local charity representatives:

- Susie Aromando described the Dorothy Aromando Art Fund, which she set up in memory of her mother last year, for the purpose of raising money for research into mesothelioma;
