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# Elm Farm on the market for £3,250,000



## A brief history

This former Craven landholding has long been the major village farm tenancy. In the mid-nineteenth century it comprised 200 acres, employing 10 men and boys.

By the 1960s it had grown to 230 acres. Three new cottages were built across the road for farmworkers.

In 1980 it was acquired by the Organic Research Centre, which continued to use the farmland for organic dairying. Villagers became fond of the regular parade of Jersey cows up and down the road to the milking sheds, gracefully impeding the impatient commuter traffic.

In the 1990s a switch was made into beef cattle. Later in the decade ORC ended its own farming activities on the land, renting it to an organic tenant, but retaining the buildings around the farmyard. These were extensively renovated to the highest environmental standards in 2008.

Small plots of land were offered for sale to villagers in 2014, slightly reducing the overall farm holding. Some ambitious projects involving the village (community broadband, biomass heating) came to nought. The unexpected and sudden departure of the CEO at the end of 2018 has given rise to local speculation about the future of Elm Farm.

Elm Farm, the agricultural heart of Hamstead Marshall, is being offered for sale freehold by private treaty, broken up into eight lots, with a total asking price of £3,250,00.

The brochure published by Carter Jonas in early June describes 213 acres (86 hectares) of mainly pasture, arable and woodland with agricultural, office and commercial buildings. The latter group includes the Grade II-listed barn, rebuilt in 2008 as a venue for conferences and social events. It has frequently been used for village activities.

The farmhouse ("period" unspecified) has five bedrooms, and is described as "in need of modernisation". In February the Organic Research Centre applied for and gained permission for change

of use of the farmhouse from offices to dwelling.

Two of the farm's 1960s cottages across the road were sold some years ago. The third, still owned as part of the farm, is currently occupied, so is not included in the sale, but its possible future availability is implied in the agent's prospectus.

"Elm Farm is offered for sale freehold and with vacant possession available. There is a share farming arrangement in place across the farm at present and the Organic Research Centre occupy the offices." (Carter Jonas)

An earlier statement by the interim CEO Stuart Rogers implied that the ORC would probably move away from the village, although there is no mention of this, nor of the farm sale, on the ORC website as of 5th June 2019.

Vacant possession of the land may prove problematic for the vendors. The new tenant, shepherd James Edwards, recently signed a 10-year lease with ORC including a share-farming agreement on all the farmland, and says he was not advised of any imminent intention to sell up. He was and still is planning to stay in the village long-term, having sold his former house and ended other grazing arrangements. He recently moved into the Elm Farm cottage, although this lease runs only to December 2019. "They can make me homeless in December," he said, "but I'm not going anywhere and nor are my sheep."

The Organic Research Centre (ORC) was established in 1980 by David Astor, under its parent the Progressive Farming Trust Ltd\*, as an educational charity, and it gives Elm Farm as its registered address. \*(company #1513190; charity #281276.)

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## Parish plan

update from Jane Arnold-Round

Following the 'show and tell' at the village market in February, the Parish Plan Working Group is working on an update to the parish plan, including new action items to cover the key areas of interest to the community: better footpath access around the village; traffic control; mobile phone signal; litter; and a possible village magazine complementary to existing forms of communication. Once the updated plan has been finalised it will be submitted to WBC for approval. Anyone with an interest in these areas is encouraged to get involved, as volunteers will be needed.

## **Annual parish assembly**

At the annual parish assembly on 18th May John Handy welcomed a small group of villagers and Enborne residents. No WBC councillors attended, and there was no TVP representation. Reports from the chair and councillors covered planning applications, local government service cuts, the Relief in Need charity\*, the White Hart, the parish plan and the village hall. The parish council maintains its own website here.

\*The Relief in Need charity stems from two separate historic bequests of land to be administered in trust for the benefit of needy people in the village. The two charities were combined in the 1990s, and parish councillors are ex-officio trustees, organising the rental of the land and the distribution of income. Peter Benest reported that £150 was distributed to three parishioners last Christmas, and that the land is satisfactorily tenanted.

## In brief

Hamstead level crossing will be closed from 22.00 to 06.00 each night of Monday 17th, Tuesday 18th and Wednesday 19th June.

The village hall hiring rate rises to £10 per hour from 1st July. The hall will be closed from 29th July until 3rd August for resurfacing the floor.



## **St Mary's Church needs friends**

St Mary's Church is muchloved by parishioners as a timeless village institution but, like most churches, it has been suffering from dwindling congregations. Its financial burdens, alas, have not been dwindling.

A generous legacy of some years ago was made specifically for the church fabric, and this has enabled the parochial

church council (PCC) to keep the building in excellent repair, a condition attested to by a recent survey and report by the Church Buildings Council, which noted treatment against beetle attack, improved drainage, rewiring, new lighting installation, and the installation of a kitchenette. The report commended this work, and designated the church, which is Grade-II\* listed, of high architectural and historical significance.



Nonetheless St Mary's is at risk, because the income generated by regular worshippers does not meet the day-to-day cost of keeping it open and holding regular services. Substantial dues are payable to the Oxford diocese. This is not a new problem: it has been a concern from some years, with various options being considered. At worst, it may mean St Mary's

being withdrawn from the benefice to be semimothballed in trust, holding only occasional weddings, funerals and festive services.

Less extreme measures may suffice if more support can be found. A high-level meeting is to be held on Tuesday 11th June, at which the PCC will explore options with representatives from the diocese of Oxford and the Church Commissioners.

## A social centre for the village...

A small group of energetic parishioners have organised regular social events in St Mary's, but the capacity of the nave is a limiting factor. However, concerts and talks in recent years have been well supported. Last winter's series of Speakers' Corner talks not only raised money for St Mary's, but brought parishioners together for congenial evenings. Venetia Dunlop plans to repeat the series starting this October.



## ....And a visitor attraction

A guided tour of St Mary's was the highlight of a local visit by a small group of U<sub>3</sub>A members in April.

The church is also a stopping point for the *Walking with Jane* tours organised by Elizabeth Pask. These guided tours (which raise funds for charity) take in various local points of interest which would have been well known to Jane Austen. Several have been held in the past and two more are planned for this summer: for Tuesday 6th and Friday 9th August. See the details here.

## The show comes back...

The Enborne and Hamstead Marshall Flower Show returns this September after a long absence from the village calendar: 2pm Saturday 7th September at Hazel Paddock, opposite Enborne School.

There will be competition classes for fruit, vegetables, flowers, crafts, cakes and more. Schedules are available from the society secretary, Penelope Lake (01635 48701).

The East Woodhay Silver Band will be playing, and there will be craft stalls as well, of course, as home-made refreshments.
